Talk About Reading

Manipulatives

At home, you can play with tactile objects that include manipulatives that we do not necessarily have in our classroom. You can use coins, a bag of dry beans, stickers, or shape cut outs. Those manipulatives help build your child's number sense skills. Reading vocab manipulatives would include some types of flashcards that would be sent home with your child.

Board Games

For reading, you can play board games or card games together. Some board games that I recommend when practicing reading skills are Hedbanz, Boggle, and Scrabble. You can sing songs, read poems, and make up rhymes! Another fun reading game would be a word game like "I Spy" or "Simon Says". Math: You can play board games involving math that include Cherry-O, Yahtzee, and Trouble. By playing board games with your children involving reading and math, they will be engaged in what they are learning and they will be practicing reading and math without even realizing.
